
June 26&27---Midwest Regional Chevelle Show at Springfield, MO



The car cruise / poker run is always a lot of fun.







### **President's Column**

Hi MACC,

I hope everyone is having a good summer so far. Summer time is always a busy time for me and my family. We have 8 Birthdays in our family during the months of July and August. With all of that going on we have been busy traveling too. We went down to Austin, Texas in late June for a wedding, and last week I went to Dallas to watch my grandson play in a 13 U baseball tournament. It's been a real treat for us to watch my grandsons' play baseball this year. Our two youngest grandsons are five and they started playing coach pitch baseball this summer, and my oldest grandson, Cole, is playing for Dayton Moore with the Royals 13 year old traveling team. They have had a great summer so far winning almost every tournament they play in. So far, they have been to Elizabeth Town, Kentucky, Atlanta, Georgia and Dallas, Texas. This weekend they are going to Indianapolis, Indiana. So, as you can see we have been busy keeping up with all of the activities.

With all of that going on I have not had as much time to work on my '70 convertible as I would have liked. However, progress is being made a little at a time. Since my last article I have finished my front end, suspension, and installed the disc brakes and brake lines.



I also installed a quick ratio gear box, so the car will handle a lot better. I did this on my red '70 and what a difference it makes in handling. You can get them at NAPA or Ground Up. Believe me, it's worth the money, around \$250.00. I have also been cleaning up some small rust spots and painted the floorboard. After I get the car back from the painter, I'm going to install some sound deadener and I have found that stuff sticks to new paint a lot better than the old paint that was in there.

With the suspension and brakes done, it is time to work on the engine. I bought a 1970 date code LS5 engine from Dan when I got the car. The engine was rebuilt but needed all the accessories added on. I started by installing a new Edelbrock Aluminum Intake Manifold, then I installed the water, fuel, and power steering pumps. I am just trying to get everything I can on before I install the motor into the car. After I get finished the next step is to take the engine off the stand and install the flywheel, clutch, bell housing, and transmission. Then it's all ready to install in the car, I hope??? The car is scheduled to go into the paint shop sometime this fall. With that said, there should be no problem getting it ready.







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Other club news is that at this month's meeting we will be giving an update on our car show, and we will be discussing some upcoming events for August. My report this month, I had hoped, was to be full of the amazing amount of progress I'd made on my various projects- but it was not to be. I'll take a little detour this month, and give y'all a different kind of column.

I've never been what you would call "worldly". Born in Kansas, and lived in different parts of the state my whole life, I just haven't had many opportunities to travel the globe. An opportunity came my way, though, when my youngest son's Tae Kwon Do school arranged a trip to South Korea. When else would my family and I have a chance to travel abroad to a foreign land with a person tour guide? We figured we had better jump on this deal- so here's how it went.

We jumped a connector flight to Dallas on a Thursday morning, and boarded our 14 hour flight from there to Incheon airport in South Korea. I'd never been on an international flight before- let alone one that long. Overall, it was a great experience, and Korean air made us as comfortable as possible. Two meals and 5 movies later, we were there! After that, it was a short (?) bus ride to where we would be staying for the next week- Taekwondowon. This is a beautiful complex specifically designed around- you guessed it- Tae Kwon Do. Nestled in the mountains, the complex was secluded and sprawling- what appeared to be approximately 100 acres devoted to the sport. The week was filled with seminars and training for Logan, and when competition time came, in his division he was put up against a young man from Brazil, and another from India. Logan took a Bronze in his division- not bad when you are competing against others from around the globe! We are sure proud of his accomplishments, and hope that he stays in the sport.

After our week at Taekwondowon, our family split from the group and struck out to do some sightseeing-Smoot style. We hopped a bus back to the outskirts of Seoul, where we checked into a Hanok (a traditional Korean house). We were really immersed in the culture at this point- taking off your shoes at the door, and sleeping behind paper doors on a 2 inch thick mat on the floor. While fun for a short period of time, after a couple of days we were ready for a real bed. While we were at the Hanok, we took in the sights, visiting local palaces and visiting all the local shops. Even with the language barrier, we were able to get around and communicate well enough to survive. After our short 2 days were up there, we caught a cab back into the heart of Seoul and checked into our hotel- real beds! The hotel was really nice, and right in the middle of the city. Within steps of our hotel was a non-stop marketplace- streets and streets full of vendors hawking everything from food to handbags, luggage, and souvenirs. Two things they seemed to be big onskin care and coffee. I've never seen so many coffee shops in my life! They were sometimes right next door to one another, and at the very most, separated by a skin care/lotion shop. We took a bus one day to the DMZ- the de-militarized zone that separates South Korea from the communist North Korea. They were full of rules and regulations for tourists- there was no peace treaty signed after the Korean War, just a ceasefire. A tourist was shot and killed there in 2009 after wandering into a restricted area, so they truly mean business. It was interesting to see and tour the tunnels that the North had dug into the South for a seemingly surprise attack. Had these tunnels not been found, the climate over there would surely be different. The South is all for a re-unification of the two halves, but the North doesn't want anything to do with it. A lot of history and culture to absorb in a short period of time.

Our take-away from the trip: South Koreans, by and large, were very nice. We enjoyed talking with the locals, and they enjoyed practicing their English on us. There is so much to do and see there, our 12 days in their country seemed short. The country was beautiful, and the cities were bustling. Industry has really come on there quickly in the last decade- with Korea being the birthplace of LG, Samsung, and Hyundai. Samsung makes everything there, from a/c units, to door locks, to cars. Hyundai builds not only the cars that we see here, but they build huge transport buses and are one of the biggest ship- builders in the world. We would sure love to return someday- there was so much that we didn't have time to see. There is a world championship there in 2017 for Tae Kwon Do- we'll have to get Logan practicing in case we get the call!
