








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After the tour we went to Garozzos for some good Italian Food

Vice-President's Column

One of the things that many of us struggle with on our "antique iron" is drivability. Whether its rear gears, trans troubles, or tires- we are all looking to make our rides more reliable and fun to drive. One thing that can sure help in the drivability department is upgrading the fuel delivery system. While our carburetors have served us well for decades, there's no denying the leaps and bounds that have come around with fuel injection. It used to be that you had to change your whole intake manifold, install a complex fuel pump system, and have the engineers from NASA come and program a system to make your car run when you made the jump to EFI. Well, not anymore! There are many new what I like to call "EFI for dummies" systems out there these days. Self-tuning, learn as you drive systems that bolt on just like your carburetor. I've actually done these conversions several times now, mainly with the FAST EZ EFI systems (see my columns from 2011: http://midamericachevelles.com/news/2011/09_2011_news.pdf, and 2014: http://midamericachevelles.com/news/2014/06_2014_news.pdf). This time around, I got to play around with a different brand- and here's how it went!

This all started with a casual conversation between our friend Ron Brightwell and myself about 6 months ago. He was contemplating doing an EFI setup on his fully restored '69 el Camino. The key to making this change on his car was to install the system in such a way that if he ever decided to sell the car or change it back, that it wouldn't take a huge amount of un-doing. We also wanted the under-hood area to look as stock as possible. What Ron settled on was the FiTech system. What's nice about this setup is that the microprocessor and most of the sensors are built into the throttle body itself. What this did for us was that it kept us from having to mount (or hide) an unsightly computer or any un-necessary hardware.



I've gotta say, the install on this kit was dead simple. We un-bolted the carb and the fuel line to it, and mounted the FiTech throttle body in its place. The only other external sensors that needed to be installed were a coolant temp sensor and the O2 sensor in the exhaust. Everything that was needed was supplied in the kit. The coolant sensor went in place of the dummy light sensor on the driver side head, and the O2 sensor came with a no-weld clamp on setup that went on easily. Simply drill a hold in the exhaust pipe, install the clamp-on bung with the supplied hardware, and that part was done! To make this system run, it only required a few wires that were easily hooked up- 12v battery positive, 12v switched ignition, and a tach signal (Ron already had a HEI distributor so it plugged right in), and that's it! The kit came with more inputs if you chose to use them- one for controlling electric fans (not used on this car), and a wire to bump up the idle when you turn the A/C on- which we hooked up right at the A/C compressor. As far as installing the throttle body and wiring -- job done.









The only other part required to make any EFI system run is a pressurized fuel system that is capable of 60psi or so. This is the part where many folks will draw the line and decide not to do this conversion. Used to be, you had to drop the tank, install a fuel pump, run high pressure lines and a return line, and that can sure be a daunting task. What FiTech offers is an easy way to get this job done, with what they call their "Fuel Command Center"- and that's what we used here. This is a self-contained fuel system that is fed by the stock fuel pump on your engine. The existing fuel pump basically just keeps the FiTech reservoir full, and the Command Center does the rest. We plumbed a line from the factory fuel filter over to the command center, which Ron had premounted on the driver front fender area where the windshield washer reservoir was. From there, we made fuel lines from the included kit and hooked up the high-pressure side to the throttle body. The reservoir does require a vent line to be hooked up, which we hooked up to the factory return line at the passenger frame area. One ground wire and hooking up the power wire included in the kit, and our fuel system was complete and ready to run.







We left the power wire off the Command Center and cranked the motor over for a minute to make sure the reservoir was full. After hooking up the power wire and checking the system for any leaks, it was time to see if we did this deal right. We hooked up the handheld controller supplied in the kit, and answered a few questions- engine size, number of cylinders, idle RPM, etc. After that, Ron hit the key and the 396 roared to life, and settled into our requested idle speed. We were unable to actually drive the car that day, as a Midwestern March Blizzard was blowing outside, but I have no doubt that the system will perform as advertised. All in all, it took the two of us 4-5 hours to complete this job. We worked at a steady, albeit leisurely pace, and that timetable also included a trip to O'Reilly auto parts and a sandwich break. These systems have gotten much more reasonable lately- with this kit (good to 400hp) coming in at \$795 retail, plus \$395 for the Fuel Command Center. Still not "cheap", per se, but it's about half of what these kits were just a few years ago.

So, if this is something that you've been considering, don't be intimidated! This is something that can be done with basic hand tools in your garage. If you have any questions or concerns about EFI, hit me up anytime. I enjoy trying out the different systems and would be happy to assist if anyone needs a hand. See y'all at the meeting!




