MID-AMERICA CHEVELLE CLUB HENDRICK CHEVROLET, MERRIAM, KS May 25, 2017 MINUTES

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 p.m. by Chair Verstraete. There were 29 persons present.

Chair Verstraete informed the members present that ten (10) Chevelles attended the car show at Hannibal, MO, adding the weather was good and the show, hosted by the LOAFERS, on Mother's Day weekend was as great as the weather.

The members were reminded of the club picnic is scheduled for June 3 at the Proudy's residence. The event would begin in the afternoon with the meal at 4:00 p.m. with club providing the meat and table accessories. All were encouraged to bring a side dish or dessert. President's Column

Why a Chevelle?

Everyone has their reason for having the cars they drive. It may be their personal car, work vehicle, or just there family car. But looking back in time what influenced you to buy a Chevelle? For some of us older guys it might be because it was the first car we ever had, or you always wanted one, or a friend had one and you always loved riding in it. For the younger guys, it may be just wanting to get into the hobby of collecting classic cars, or they just want a true legend in the muscle car era. Everyone has their reason and here is mine.





For me it was my dad who liked Chevrolets cars. We had Ford trucks and tractors on the farm but his cars were always Chevys. First car I remember was Dad's 1955 four-door Bel Air. Then when I was about 11 or 12, Dad said he was going to buy a new Chevy Impala when the 1963 models came out. I was just starting to get interested in cars then and in the fall of 1962 the preview of the 63's were coming out on the TV show called Bonanza. The show aired on Sunday night and I can remember sitting on the couch just to see what the new cars were going to look like. The new Impala was the car I was waiting to see, but they had this new model of the Corvette that they previewed that night; it was called the Sting Ray. At that point of my young life Corvette's were all I could think about. I just had to have one when I was 16. All I talked about for a long time was the Corvette Sting Ray. I made model cars of it and read everything about them. Think I was about 14 when my dad was so tired of hearing about Corvettes he said to me. (THERE'S NO WAY IN HELL YOU ARE GOING TO GET A CORVETTE WHEN YOU TURN 16). Talk about letting a kid down easy on his dreams. So my Mom knew how disappointed I was and how stupid of an idea that a 16 year old kid was getting a Corvette, she said I read in the newspaper today that Chevrolet is coming out in 1964 with a new model called the Chevelle. It's a midsized car; you should look at one of these cars. Think she just wanted to get my mind off of buying a Corvette. As luck would have it, my grandparent's bough a 300 Deluxe Chevelle in 1964 from Dennis Chevrolet in Olathe Kansas. My uncle Charlie also bought an SS with bucket seats in 1964 too. I was hooked at that point on what I wanted when I turned 16. My cousin, Jerry, who was a year older than me bought a 1966 Malibu, Marina Blue with a black interior and a 283 engine. When I saw that car I decided that's what I had to have for sure. I was working on the family's truck farm and my dad would always plant some tomato plants for me to take care of and I would make the money off of them. That summer I was 16, I planted 200 Tomato plants to make some extra money to help buy a new car. In the summer of 1967, I got my first new car, a 1967 Malibu, Marina Blue with a blue interior. I saw a SS396, 4 speed Chevelle the same color in the dealer show room but knew better than to press for that one. I was walking on air that summer evening when dad took me down to Ed Roberts Chevrolet to pick up my car. Ed Roberts came out and said to me, (son the first clutch is on me, the second one is on you). Don't know why he would tell a 16 year old kid that but I took it in stride and hoped I didn't blow the clutch the first week. Loved that car, and almost waxed the paint off of it. I took Janet on our first date in that car.



But as I got older I had to have an SS396 car. After I got out of high school I got a job in the sheet metal trade and saved up enough money to buy a 1970 SS396. I told my dad I went down to Ed Roberts Chevrolet and order a new Chevelle. He asks me what engine you getting in that car. I told him just the stock one that comes in a Super Sport package, that's all. He didn't say much but at 19 I guess he figured if I could pay for it myself I could have what I wanted. I remember in February of 1970 Dad and I went down to pick up my Super Sport. It was setting out in front of the dealer show





room, right on Main Street. When my dad saw the car, he said to me you bought that red car with those blanky- blank stripes on it? What's wrong with you? I didn't care at that time what he thought, I was getting the Chevelle I worked for and paid for on my own and he wasn't going to ruin it for me. That was a great car and I did a lot of drag racing in it. I was always messing around with it trying to make it go faster. I owned that car for two and half years and like everyone who owns a Chevelle today I wished I would have never sold it and wondered what ever happened to it. Maybe it was wrecked beyond repair, maybe it's a show car somewhere, or just maybe it's in a barn waiting for someone like me to restore. I just wish I could find out.



Over the years I have owned 11 different Chevelle's. In the late 80's I was buying and selling them trying to make a buck or two. When Janet and I got out of the greenhouse business in 98 it was time to buy another one, and that is the Red 1970 hardtop I have now. When I first saw the car it brought back so many memories of a time in my live that I will always treasure.

Well I may have never owned a Corvette, but I still love them and maybe just maybe there will be one yet.







So that's my story and I'm sure everyone out there that owns a classic car has his or her reason for owning the car they have. He spent the better part of the day laying out the roof, trimming where needed, steaming out the wrinkles from shipping, and then finally gluing and finishing with the chrome trim. His attention to detail, and his carefulness around fresh paint were much appreciated. Hats off to James- he's earned my business for future upholstery work!





One other thing that I was a part of over the last month was a road trip to Hannibal, MO for a car show put on by our friends The Loafers. This great group of enthusiasts always make a great showing at our show, and am I glad we finally returned the favor! The show was held in historic




